Find out about traditional Inuit life and explore the materials available to craftsmen in a cold environment.

- Interactive guided tour of Inuit objects around the Museum, including some object handling (40 minutes)
- Self-guided activity sheet, pencils provided (20 minutes)
- Plenary (5 minutes)

- Please allow for extra time if you want to visit the shop, or explore the Museum further

### Learning Outcomes

#### Aims


- Understand what objects can tell us about the traditional way of life of the Inuit
- Explore how environment influences the materials used to make objects
- Discover more about traditional Inuit clothing, hunting, pastimes, shelter and transport

#### Key Concepts

- Environment
- Materials
- Survival
- Hunting
- Clothing
- Shelter

## Pre-visit activities

- Find the Arctic circle on a map and look at which countries are nearby.
- Research where the Inuit people live. Find out about the landscape and what animals are found on the land and sea.

## Post-visit activities

- Create a Survival Guide for the Arctic.
- Find out about traditional stories of the Inuit people.
- Compare the Inuit with a group of people who live in the tropics such as in South America, Papua New Guinea or Uganda.
